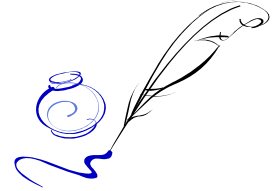

Workshop: Cache County Medusahead Rye Weed Prevention Area

Medusahead Rye is one of the second generation invasive annual grasses that is far worse than cheatgrass and has the potential of spreading onto and dominating 60 million acres of sagebrush rangelands in the Intermountain Region. A Weed Prevention Area has been established in the south end of Cache County to control Medusahead and prevent it from spreading southward throughout the rest of the state. The workshop will discuss the grass-roots organization of the weed prevention area in treating 1100 acres, the cooperative efforts of ARS research, Utah Department of Agriculture and Food funding, and the technical support of NRCS, Blacksmith Fork Conservation District and the Cache County Weed Department.

Presenters include, Roger Sheley and Brenda Smith, ARS, Oregon; Kevin Jensen and Tom Monaco, ARS, Utah; Earl Creech, Corey Ransom and Chris Call, USU, Logan; David Mabey, NRCS, Logan.

RANGE EXCELLENCE

The Utah Section Range Excellence Committee reviews and recognizes rangelands within the State, which reflect quality management and good land stewardship. The committee is calling for new nominations for the coming year. The following criteria are suggested for evaluation and selection of range excellence areas:

1. Rangelands in satisfactory condition, improving under current management, and progressing toward management goals.
2. Improvement in condition is or can be documented and demonstrated.
3. A mix of land uses (livestock grazing, wildlife habitat, recreation, etc.) and ownership result in diversified and sustained benefits.
4. The area demonstrates either intensive or extensive management systems on mountain, foothill, riparian, or other range types.

Nominations should include a description and maps of the area, general background and management information, and a willingness to tour and inspect the area with members of the Range Excellence Committee. We are asking for your involvement in the nomination of suitable areas for this important recognition.

Summer Tour 2010



June 3 and 4th could not have had better. We had perfect weather for touring southern Utah and learning about new habitat manipulation strategies, working with high school students and planning strategies with the new uses and values placed on the rangeland that we manage.

The first stop of the tour was the Heaton Ranch outside of Alton, Utah to discuss the recent habitat manipulation and high elevation forage kochia trials. Working with USU extension, DWR, and NRCS the ranch was able to implement a “push” of the brush species with reseeding in one pasture. The goal was to enhance the habitat in an important sage grouse travel corridor entice the birds to



to better locations away from the potential disturbances. The high elevation forage kochia plots are evaluating the response of several varieties of forage kochia to the growing conditions and the grazing pressures. Spike has also been applied to several acres of older sagebrush stands. The group was able to discuss treatments and results with the managers.



From the Heaton Ranch we toured several locations in the Upper Kanab Creek Watershed project. This watershed project has been a great example of how to look at the watershed or landscape perspective for planning as well as how to implement treatments on the ground. The purpose of the project is to rehabilitate vegetation and reduce the risk of catastrophic fire. The BLM has been the lead agency on many of the projects and different treatment methods including

a bull hog, herbicides, prescribed fire, seedings, and modifications of domestic livestock grazing have been implemented. Questions on how to choose the treatment locations and design and how to implement a complete monitoring program to determine what treatments work and what treatments do not led to interesting discussions. Next, we moved into more PJ treatments completed by the BLM. These treatments were designed to reduce the tree canopy cover and stimulate the sagebrush quality and quantity for the benefit of the ecological processes and the big game that frequent the area.



Summer Tour continued

On Friday, one stop was at a youth project funded in part by grants from the BLM Take it Outside Program. The local high school students are involved in native plant restoration on BLM lands in places where BLM has had little success in the past. Through this project, the students collected winter-fat seed from nearby healthy areas, and grew the plants in the greenhouse, and then planted and watered the seedlings in the field at the disturbed location. Over the next few years, the students using scientific monitoring methods will monitor the progress of the seedlings.



A big thank you to all that participated and attended! We could not complete these tours without the support of the individuals completing the work on the ground. I am excited to see this much work accomplished. There are many questions to answer in the future as we try to balance the values placed on and services required from the rangelands that we work on and love. We hope to see all of you next year! 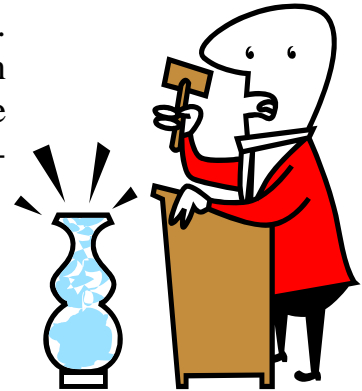
Silent Auction

2011 Rangeland Cup - Topic and Deadline

The Rangeland Cup team problem solving competition is an activity to promote critical thinking and cooperative, collaborative work on current topics and/or topics of historical importance to rangeland ecology and management. As we progress in our careers, much of our work is performed as part of a group. This competition is intended to build skills in interpersonal communication and group-problem solving, both of which are highly desired qualities in the workplace.

Dominant paradigms developed by rangeland science guide management practices which can result in long-lasting impacts for rangeland systems. Such impacts are inherited by successive generations of scientists and managers, thus becoming legacies of past management.

1. Choose one prominent management practice or paradigm developed by early pioneers in the rangeland management profession that has left a legacy which impacts how we manage rangelands today. Discuss the scientific rationale for broad-scale implementation of the practice (historically) and describe how the implementation of the practice has positive, negative or neutral impacts on our current management strategies. Consider multiple types of impacts (ecological, economic, social, etc.).
2. Discuss a management practice of a rangeland ecosystem outside North America and how this strategy may leave legacies for future generations. Compare this example to the issue you discussed previously in number 1. How might information from this international example be incorporated into contemporary rangeland management paradigms in North America?
