Utah Range Camp 2023

This year Range Camp was held at the SUU Mountain Center near Cedar City, Utah. We had a rocky start when 2 days before camp started, our caterer canceled on us. My mom and sister Layna and Sadie Farnsworth were able to bail us out and cooked for us all week. I still believe it was only because they were able to visit my other sisters 1-year old daughter who lives in Cedar City. We had 13 attendees, Cooper Obray, Garrett Finlinson, Brooklin Goble, Jade Goble, Sydney Bosh, Emmitt Nelson, Jake Brinkerhoff, Korver Staples, Maddie Cox, Holden Harris, Hadley Harris, Aden Patterson, and Theron Dye from North and South Sevier, Kane, and Carbon Counties.

Monday afternoon and evening were spent learning about stocking rates, grazing rotations, plant ID, ESD, Range Management, and GIP projects thanks to Ashlee Longmore (USU) myself (USU), Dean Winward (SUU), and Randy Marshall (GIP), and Jeff Barnes (NRCS/CDE).

On Tuesday we tagged along with the WRI tour that started at the Beaver County Fairgrounds. We discussed pinyon and juniper treatments, sagebrush reseedings, stream improvements, reseedings, and BDA's. The kids persuaded us to stop at the Beaver Creamery after the tour, it wasn't too hard to convince us since the temperatures were nearing 100 degrees. That evening one of the vans broke down but we were able to get everyone back to the mountain center where we performed a blacklight test to show the coumarins and palatability in certain sagebrush species like Wyoming and Silver Sagebrush vs mountain sagebrush. Eric Thacker (USU) also gave a presentation on wildlife and rangelands.

On Wednesday, Lara Kitchen (BLM) showed us some prairie dog relocation burrows, sagebrush treatments, and reseedings and talked about being a Range Con for the BLM. We walked the kids through several of the tests they will encounter at the Western Regionals Competition this fall including Plant ID, Shrub Intercept, ESD reference state, and soil texturing and horizons. We had lunch at the Parowan Gap Petroglyphs where we followed Ethan Hooper (FS) up Paragonah Canyon where we talked about some PJ treatments, utilization monitoring, NEPA, and working for the Forest Service. We circled back around to Brian Head where we found out that the other van had brake issues. Luckily, they held until we made it back to camp although most of us smelled like hot brakes the rest of the evening. Clare Poulsen (NRCS) gave a presentation on Restoration that evening and helped out a lot with plant ID throughout the day.

Thursday Dean Winward and Jeff Barnes spent the morning with the kids going over a few more things that would be on their competition like current issues facing rangelands, and estimating percent biomass while I set up the final Plant ID test. Ruger Carter (USU PHD Student) presented on pursuing higher education in Rangeland Management. He talked about a study he led in the Grand Staircase Monument about cattle distribution using GPS collars, and the study he is working on now, tracking Sage Grouse with GPS harnesses. That evening the kids

each gave a 2-minute oral presentation about something they learned at Range Camp and then they had to answer any questions Jeff Barnes and Linden Greenalgh (USU) threw their way. At the end of Range Camp, we grade their oral presentations, notebook notes, plant ID tests, participation, and their plant collection (they need to collect 25 plants and correctly label them to get full points). SRM provides the top 2 competitors with a paid expense trip to the Parent SRM Society meeting which will be held in Sparks Nevada this upcoming year. The results are as follows;
